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EASL Forum Program



The EASL Forum is an interdisciplinary group of scholars who meet weekly in collaborative 90 minute sessions focused on pressing social issues, leadership development, and community engagement. The Forum consists of 10 to 15 students who learn and serve together over the course of 22 weeks from September to April. The shared journey focuses on four areas: integrity, personal growth, bridge building, and community engagement.

In the spring semester, Forum students will put into action the concepts they developed during the year, working in small groups to plan and deliver a project to enhance the Emory or local community. This project will be hands-on and will address a need or problem on campus and will result in a tangible, sustainable solution. Forum students will present on their projects at our closing celebration at the end of Spring semester.


