



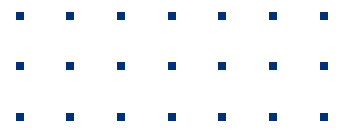

Four are produced on our brand new Coca Cola Stage, four are produced in the underground Hertz, and four are part of our family series which includes productions for ages 0 – 3 years old. We also host the annual Reiser Atlanta Artists Lab competition which provides funding and resources to teams of local Atlanta artists. The Bakery Atlanta is a collective of artists, curators, and administrators dedicated to offering alternative models to local creatives and the general public. We host and produce experiences that connect and inspire people through collaboration, experimentation, and play.

Moreover, we support the emerging, DIY arts community through community projects and engagement events, hosting workshops, classes, art exhibitions, and offering a host of digital resources for artists including our artists opportunities page and artist directory. In addition to these offerings, we also coordinate, curate, and install artwork in public and private spaces.

Concrete Jungle

Concrete Jungle was started by a group of friends scavenging for overlooked apple trees in Atlanta. Thus, Concrete Jungle became an organization whose mission is to forage, farm, and support food access across Georgia.

Concrete Jungle provides fresh produce to food-insecure families by distributing excess produce from fruit trees and farms throughout the region; growing food on our farm; and providing nutrition education resources. As of December 2023, Concrete Jungle had distributed over 2 million pounds of fresh, nutritious food.

Concrete Jungle's main programs include its flagship program, Fruit Picks and Adventure Picks, PEEL (Produce Education and Enjoyment Loop), and Produce Buyers Club.

Through PEEL, Concrete Jungle distributes these fruits and vegetables to agencies throughout Atlanta doing the important work of feeding their communities. In 2018, Concrete Jungle began providing educational opportunities at food pantries and soup kitchens to help familiarize clients with local and less common varieties of produce. Through taste tests, recipe demonstrations, and cooking classes the PEEL program ensures that Concrete Jungle makes produce available and accessible for our partners' clients.

The Produce Buyers Club purchases imperfect produce from farms in South Georgia for distribution among hunger relief agencies in the Atlanta area. The program is unique because the produce was picked within a few days of when it is distributed, unlike the food bank or other produce providers who are giving produce that has surpassed its shelf life.
